
Math Olympiad





Saint Leo’s entered two teams under the direction and guidance of Mrs. Tommolino and the teams’ mentor, Miss Jenna Stagliano. The teams were Vecitous Luminous, Brazil and Beaumont, Switzerland. The members of the teams worked very hard on making their cities. The theme and concept for this year’s competition was “Tomorrow’s Transit.” The challenge was to identify a problem of moving people in your future city and design a mode of transportation to solve the problem. Thee competition consisted of creating a

virtual city on the Sim City computer program, writing an essay and a narrative about the city and its transportation, and creating a scale model of the city that the team has created. The scale model had to be constructed out of recyclable materials. Each team had a very unique form of transportation.

Twenty-eight schools attended the competition and seventy-nine model cities were entered. The Teams worked hard to build their cities and were excited to show off all their hard work that they had done. Saint Leo’s entry of Beaumont, Switzerland won an award for “Most Futuristic City.” Beaumont, Switzerland is a small mining town incorporated into a mountain. Its environmentally friendly and effective forms of transportation consist of gondolas and an internal train called the Internum. Both systems are powered by wind turbines and are extremely advanced, especially in their horizontal and vertical underground maneuverability.
